#### United States 2020 Census Everyone Counts – Help Spread the Word



The 2020 Census count is a once-in-a-decade population count mandated by the constitution to record everyone living in the United States on April 1, 2020. It's done for two purposes:

- Determines how many seats each state has in the Congress.
- Determines how 675 billion dollars in federal funds is distributed to states and our local communities.

This is the first Census count where no paper version will be mailed out. Everyone is strongly encouraged to complete the census on-line or phone. The City of Sunnyvale has allocated resources to conduct Census outreach and education to encourage all residents to complete the Census. In the March 5<sup>th</sup> SNAIL meeting, city staff will present additional information about the 2020 Census and its importance; please join us. We ha speake spent a

Have you heard of Recycling's Dirty Dozen? It's a list of twelve confusing items that many residents think are recyclable, but in fact are not. Here are examples of the most bewildering offenders:

- Black plastic: Black plastic melts at a higher temperature than clear plastic. Plus, the black pigment dyes everything else black!
- Plastic "clamshells": These also don't melt well with other plastics, due to their "thermoform" process. This makes them brittle, rigid, and difficult to recycle.
- Frozen food boxes: These boxes are treated with a special chemical that doesn't let them break down when wet. This is an issue since water is used to break paper down!
- Paper egg cartons: Every time paper is recycled, it decreases in quality. Egg cartons use the lowest quality paper, making them undesirable in markets.

#### DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME BEGINS HISTORY

Daylight Savings Time (DST) began to help save energy and provide workers with more hours of serviceable daylight during the long summer days. However, it was not until 1966, when the Uniform Act was passed, that all states had to either observe DST or pass a state law to abstain.

#### **DST BEGINS FACTS**

- Benjamin Franklin first proposed the idea of DST in 1784. He wrote "An Economical Project" for the Journal of Paris, wherein he discussed the cost of oil for lamps as well as working while it was dark and sleeping while it was day.
- DST changes at 2:00 a.m. This time is selected to provide the least amount of inconvenience to businesses and citizens.
- When DST begins in the Northern Hemisphere, it is ending in the Southern Hemisphere.
- DST always begins on the second Sunday in March and ends on the first Sunday in November.
- Hawaii and Arizona do not use DST. Only part of Indiana used it, but since 2006, it's used throughout the whole state.
- California first observed DST in 1918. In 2018, California passed Proposition 7 allowing the California State Legislature to (1) change the dates and times of the DST period, as consistent with federal law, by a two-thirds vote; (2) establish permanent, yearround DST in California by a two-thirds vote if federal law is changed to allow for permanent DST; and (3) take action to change time policy concerning both DST and standard time.

#### DST BEGINS TOP EVENTS AND THINGS TO DO

- Move your clocks forward one hour before bed on the Saturday night before Daylight Savings Time day in March.
- Replace the batteries in your smoke alarm and carbon dioxide monitors.

• Clean out the medicine cabinet. Dispose of all medicines properly. Sources: https://tinyurl.com/CAProp7




