HIGHLIGHTS OF LAST MONTH'S SNAIL ZOOM MEETING

Guest Speakers: Department of Public Safety - Chief Phan S. Ngo, Deputy Chief Steve Drewniany, Deputy Chief Jim Choi, Captain Dan Pistor, Captain David Sakurai

Chief Phan S. Ngo: In 2020, public safety received four new fire trucks. A new Emergency Operations Center (EOC) building has been approved, with lots of new and expanded features.

 Racial justice and police reforms: Sunnyvale Public Safety supports constitutional policing and recognizes this is a transitional process. The city held five listening sessions during the last year and the feedback has been good, but "don't let it slip".
 Incremental changes are being made because we have a head start on most of the nation. Documents are available online. The Chief and City Manager continue working on transparency improvements.

Crime: There has been a reduction in crime, yet still for someone experiencing crime, that experience is too many.

INAUGURATION DAY HISTORY

Inauguration Day marks the beginning of the new four-year term of the President of the United States. The Inauguration of the U.S. President garners national attention. Held in Washington D.C., the Inauguration ceremony takes place on the western front of the U.S. Capitol Building.

This day is a federally recognized holiday for all workers within the District of Columbia, and several counties in both Maryland and Virginia. Inauguration Day falls on January 20th every fourth year unless the 20th falls on a Sunday. In this case, it is held on January 21st.

INAUGURATION DAY FACTS

The Twentieth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution changed the date from March 4th to January 20th.

The only President to take the oath of office without placing his hand upon a Bible was Theodore Roosevelt in January 1901. He was sworn in with an uplifted hand.

The U.S. Constitution only mandates the person take an oath or affirmation before he/she can take office.

Various Presidents have added their own twist to the swearing in ceremony, including kissing the Bible, or adding the words so help me God in closing.

Free, Virtual Healthy Eating Program in Spanish (Veggie Rx): Mondays, 6:00 – 7:30 p.m. starting on Feb. 15th via Zoom. Program by Fresh Approach and includes: 8 nutrition classes with cooking demos, free vouchers for fruits and veggies at local farmers' markets (over \$400 for a family of 4) and help with monitoring your weight and health. School Break Camp (Camp Explorer) for Youth: Feb. 16th – 19th Youth, ages 5-12, are invited join Sunnyvale staff for fun-filled days of in person, recreation activities camp designed with COVID-19 safety protocols in place including social distancing, and face coverings. Camp hours are 8 am to 5:30 pm and fees are \$240 (Res)/\$290 (Non-Res). Fee Wavier or \$234 subsidy is available for families that qualify based on income, pre-approval required, call CNC for more information or application. Two locations: CNC or Community Center. Free Food Distribution, Family Harvest: Families in need of food are invited to register for the Family Harvest Program, a monthly food distribution program that takes place on the last Wednesday of the month. Families drive through the CNC/CMS parking lot and volunteers load about 100 pounds of food (dry, can and fresh food) into each car with no contact. The next distribution is scheduled for *Wednesday, Feb. 24th, 3:20 - 4:10 p.m.*

Register for "ShapeUp" Sunnyvale (Free): Session 3, Feb. 27th – Mar. 27th. An active living and healthier eating program funded by El Camino Healthcare District. Any Sunnyvale resident is invited to sign up with priority given to residents on public assistance. Once registered, choose to participate in both components (physical activity and healthier cooking) or just one. For getting active, choose from a menu of activities, virtual or in-person, offered through Recreation Services such as aquatics fitness, yoga, Zumba, etc. and participate in a minimum of one activity weekly. For the cooking component, pick up a cooking kit weekly, from CNC or the Community Center, prepared by a professional caterer and make the dish at home. There will be a recorded video of the caterer making the dish and an optional weekly Zoom meeting for advice or questions. Registration required, call CNC for registration forms and information. -Angela Chan, CNC Manager



Sunnyvale Emergency Response Volunteers

SERV is the volunteer arm of the Sunnyvale Department of Public Safety, Office of Emergency Services. SERV volunteers teach disaster preparedness classes, assist uniformed officers in emergencies, and respond in disasters when professional responders are overloaded.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

Listos California disaster preparedness classes, taught by SERV volunteers, teach how to prepare your home and family for disasters and emergencies. The classes are offered in English and Spanish.

DISASTER RESPONSE

Sunnyvale's Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) supplements uniformed officers in responding to emergencies, disasters, and public service events.

EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS REMINDER

2020 was a year of reckoning and a good reminder to be prepared for the Earth's natural cycles. The last global pandemic was in 1918; the Spanish Flu swept slowly around the world. Oddly enough, the last big earthquake in California was on April 18th, 1906; a 7.9 jolt, scary indeed. We do not know when we will face the next big one, but we can prepare ourselves to diminish its impacts, like having our water, food and medical supplies for the next 72 hours. This is critical for our survival in case of major damage to the Bay Area infrastructure. Secure everything in your house. On October 30th, 2007, I had a fiftygallon aquarium sitting on a shelf in the living room, not secured to the wall in my North San Jose home. As soon as I felt the jolt, I ran from my room to the living room to push the shelf against the wall while the water splashed back and forth on my face. Yes, I learned my lesson the hard way! The 5.6 shake was no joke. Be sure to identify where your gas meter is located and have a tool readily available to close it in case of a broken pipe; same goes for water. Try to mentally rehearse or physically practice how you will react in case of an earthquake as we tend to freeze or act frantically in an emergency. I do not mean to scare you, but this advice could well save your life. I pray that we never have to go through this, but if we do, we will be prepared for it.
