MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR

The planting season is upon us.



With the steady increase of inflation, and the high-cost vegetables at the local markets, it is time to start thinking about planting that home vegetable garden and saving

some money on groceries.

It is no secret that homegrown vegetables have a much better taste than some of the ones found in the local stores. As many of you know, I am not a gardener. However, last year, my planting yield was very limited. Listening to a very dear friend of mine this year, I decided to work on my planter and prepare it for the growing season. I approached my planter with determination to turn the remaining clay-like soil and prepare it for planting.

I armed myself with tools, fork, rake, shovel and dug deep into the planter, turned the dark and heavy clods of earth, breaking every clump, flipping from the bottom to the top, and mixing it with fresh store-bought soil, and added a few nutrients such as the pulverized dried eggshell. Missing from all of this was compost and worm casting which I purchased at the new OSH. That project starts tomorrow!

SUNNYVALE FOR EQUITY IN EDUCATION (SEE) UPDATE



A wide range of voices came out to the City Council meeting on January 9th to make public comments about extending Silicon Valley Hopper shuttles to Sunnyvale. Silicon Valley Hopper is an on-demand electric shuttle program that already runs well in Cupertino and

Santa Clara. If extended to Sunnyvale, it could serve Homestead and Fremont students who want to have safe and timely rides home from evening extracurricular activities. SEE has had conversations with FUHSD about the school district subsidizing the costs of the shuttle to students.

Council voted to agendize the SV Hopper grant as a budget amendment while also considering the future of study issue #23-06, which we advocated for last year. There are CalSTA grant funds available that need to be matched by the City. Sunnyvale could expedite the start-up of shuttles by joining the City of Cupertino's renewal submission. If there is a will and funding, shuttles could be in place by this fall for the school year 2024-25. We hope Sunnyvale can act nimbly to meet the needs of students and residents throughout Sunnyvale that cannot, or choose not, to drive single occupancy vehicles.



Measure C is a \$214 million school bond for Sunnyvale School District schools on the March 5th Primary Election ballot. Measure C will provide funds to renovate older schools, make campuses more accessible, improve instructional technology, develop additional

counseling areas to support students' mental health, and increase campus safety and security at schools in the District. The average yearly cost to property owners in Sunnyvale SD will be \$15 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. Please visit:

Sunnyvale Solid Waste staff is running a pilot program to reduce plastic food ware. The program helps local restaurants replace disposable plastic food ware with reusable or

compostable options. Along with the help of Environmental Innovations, staff recruited eighteen participating restaurants. Thirteen are testing reusable food ware for dine-in customers, and the remaining five are testing compostable food ware for to-go orders. The pilot program began in November 2023 and ends in early March. Go to https://www.sunnyvale.ca.gov and search "Reusable Pilot" for a list of participating restaurants.

We're excited to announce a new component of the pilot: reusable, borrow-able cups! We've partnered with Okapi Reusables to implement their cup-borrowing program at Bambu Desserts & Drinks. Once customers download the Okapi app, they can scan a code to receive their drink in a reusable glass cup. They'll return the cup at a later point to any of the 65 cafes in Okapi's network. Okapi is looking to expand to other cafes or boba shops in Sunnyvale.

Want to do even more to reduce plastic food ware? There are some restaurants in Sunnyvale that allow customers to bring their own reusable containers or cups. https://siliconvalleyreduces.org lists these restaurants along with simple "how to" instructions for customers.

ARTIFICIAL TURF IN SUNNYVALE

There is a new local group of parents and environmental activists focused on the impact of artificial turf in our community. Community for Natural Play Surfaces (CFNPS) advocates for safe natural play surfaces and educates people on the harms of artificial turf (AT) and other artificial materials. CFNPS strives to increase the amount of grass and natural materials in our playing fields, playgrounds, parks, and towns.

The current focus is the 12 old athletics fields at FUHSD that need replacing. They are made of AT, and the Board needs to decide whether to keep AT or to go back to natural grass. Specific highlights include:

Sunday, February 4, 2024, from 3:00-4:00 PM at the Cupertino Public Library (10800 Torre Avenue). Susan Hinton, Chair of the Sierra Club Loma Prieta Chapter's Plastic Pollution Prevention Team, will share an informative presentation comparing natural grass and artificial turf. Which one saves water? Which is better for the environment? Come learn about the health risks and environmental impacts of artificial turf and turf alternatives.
